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
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Find Tri-Spy Tours on the Travel Channel

Margo Arceri of Tri-Spy Tours—Woman of the Year

With the help of those who appreciate history, events of the past have a chance to live on. Margo Arceri is one of those history lovers, and her passion has inspired others to learn more about their local landscape.

Arceri didn't need the AMC series "TURN" to discover how instrumental the members of the Culper Spy Ring were in the Colonies winning the American Revolutionary War. While growing up in Strong's Neck, she learned about the Setauket spies directly from Kate W. Strong herself. The great-great-granddaughter of Anna Smith Strong would tell stories of the patriot who used her clothesline to send messages to her fellow spies, and through those tales, Arceri

developed a deep curiosity for history and the local intelligence group.

Three Village Historical Society historian Beverly Tyler said Arceri's passion is so strong her car features "Culper" license plates.

"She loves the Revolutionary War," Tyler said. "She loves Anna Smith Strong, and the whole idea of the spy ring."

A few years ago, Arceri, a former vice president and past secretary of the Three Village Historical Society, created Tri-Spy Tours, where participants follow the footsteps of the spies by walking, biking and/or kayaking through the area.

Steven Hintze was the president of the society when Arceri came to him with the

idea of the tours. He said he liked the concept and discussed it with the board members.

Hintze said it was while conducting Tri-Spy Tours that Arceri realized there was more to share about local history, so she developed Culper Spy Day, an annual event that sponsors a self-guided tour where attendees visit various structures and museums in the area to learn how the Setauket spies assisted President George Washington during the Revolutionary War. Hintze said the day, which marked its third year in September, has greatly grown in popularity, attracting history lovers from all over the tristate area. According to historical society records, the



Digitizing Long Island History By Karen Martin

The Three Village Historical Society is participating in a program designed to help historical societies preserve local historical documents. The Palmer School of Library & Information Science at LI University has received a grant from the Robert David Lion Gardiner Foundation for the digitization of selected materials from historical societies on Long Island. The initial 2016 two year \$500,000 grant was recently increased by \$1 million and expands the Digitizing Long Island History project to 80 historical societies over four years.



including the treatment of small pox, family history research, documentation of people of color, etc. Dr. Muirson (b.1705-d.1786) married the daughter of Col William and Martha Smith of the Manor of St. George. Because of his active support of the British and “the aid and comfort” given to it during the Revolution, Dr. Muirson’s property was confiscated and he went to CT. His lands in Old Field consisted of about 150 acres including his dwelling and a hospital. Drs. Muirson & Griffing were administering small pox (later kine pox)

inoculations which would give the patient a light case and protect them from

disease. The town records of 7 December 1761 grant permission to Dr. Muirson to administer inoculations to Mr.

Nelson and Mrs. Muirson. It also states that “Mr. Muirson, Do likewise agree not to inoculate for ye future in ye Town without consent of Trustees...”

Several early account books from the 1760s-1850 were also selected for scanning. The account books of Thomas Shepard Strong (b.1765-d.1840), son of Selah and Anna (Nancy) Strong, dating from 1795-1850 include financial information as it relates to his various business interests including shipping, the farm, household accounts, and contains names of individuals, etc. The Joseph Denton account book contains the accounts of local residents for saddlery, leather work, etc. for the period 1762-1802.

Several items profiled in the society’s exhibit and book *The Sailing Circle* including Mary Satterly Rowland’s journals (Oct. 1855-Feb. 1857 & Jan. 1867-July 1867) and the 1875 diary of Ellen Elizabeth Evans Jones (wife of Captain Benjamin Jones, kept while sailing from New York to Peru) were also

selected. They tell of their experiences sailing with their ship captain husbands. Also included is the log of the Bark *Mary and Louisa* (27 Sept. 1862-8 Oct. 1863).

Kathryn M. Curran, Executive Director of the Robert David Lion Gardiner Foundation states the “Foundation’s mission is to promote our regional history. The artifacts and archives of historical societies are untapped treasure troves for researchers and scholars. It is our hope that this award will make these collections available as vital part of local historic study. The Palmer School is our region’s leading institution to offer the expertise and resources to accomplish this goal.”

“The Gardiner Foundation’s grant will allow us to preserve Long Island’s history and ensure that the next generation of archival professionals has the skills to preserve history in the digital age,” said Dr. Gregory Hunter, Professor of Library and Information Science and head of the doctoral program at the Palmer School. The grant provides fellowships for master’s and doctoral students.

“Gardiner Fellows” will spend 120 hours digitizing historical images according to the highest industry standards and benefit through professional training and experience and receive a fellowship for 6 credits of tuition. Portable digitization units allow students to scan materials on-site at the historical societies while fragile, oversized, and bound items are brought to the Palmer School’s Lab for scanning on a large DT Atom tabletop digitization platform.

Approximately 1 cu ft. of documents were selected from the TVHS archives and brought to the Palmer School Lab for scanning in Dec. 2017. Taking advantage of the state of the art equipment at the Palmer School Lab, the availability of an overhead scanner (resembling a photographic copy stand) would allow our more fragile journals and account books to be scanned without damage to their bindings and with minimal handling. Scanning of these items from our archives will not only help to preserve the originals, but also give researchers access to these fragile materials in digital form.

Among the items selected were the account books of two local physicians Dr. George Muirson (dating from 1749-1758) & Dr. Joel Griffing (dating from 1815-1817). These books document the patient’s name, illness, treatment and fees. These records are a wealth of untapped information relating to the early medical history of the area,

Peach Cobbler Recipe from Alyne Darling of Stony Brook By Barbara Russell



Alyne Snover Darling was a schoolteacher and principal in the Stony Brook Union Free School, retiring in 1957 after 35 years. She married Ralph Wheeler Darling in 1923, and they lived on Erland Road. The following is her recipe for Peach Cobbler.

- 1 c. flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 1/8 tsp salt
- 1/2 c. sugar
- 1/4 c. + 1 tbs. butter
- 1 large egg
- 3 tbs. milk
- 1/2 tsp vanilla
- 3 c. sliced fresh peaches

Drop peaches into boiling water, then peel, core, and slice. Arrange in a buttered baking dish, dot with 1 tbs. butter, and sprinkle with cinnamon.

In a bowl, stir together dry ingredients. Cut in the butter. Set aside.

In a 2nd bowl, beat egg until thick and ivory colored. Stir in milk and vanilla. Then add it to the flour mixture; stir only until smooth. Spread batter over the peaches. Bake at 375, about 35-40 minutes. Serve hot with whipped cream or ice cream.

The Historic 2001 NY YANKEES POSTSEASON in a 3 part series by Bob Lauto



Looking forward to warmer weather and the potentials of spring-training baseball, I reflect back to a historic baseball postseason of 2001. The 2001 baseball postseason was uniquely dramatic and historic because this was the year of the attack on America. On September 11th, 2001, the World Trade Center had collapsed in the attack on the United States, and baseball, after a 2 week layoff, had only resumed shortly before the postseason started. New York City was again playing host for the postseason, this time crippled from the recent attack.

By 2001 I was a Yankees season ticket holder for a few years and this postseason felt different than the rest. Due to the nature of the country and of the city, people were in shock. Attending large venues was worrisome as they were thought to be targets for terrorists. Should we enjoy ourselves? Was that acceptable, with the city still at work in the rubble in downtown Manhattan? President Bush had told America to go out and continue life as usual. Anything otherwise was letting the terrorist win. With no one interested in the postseason tickets I had to offer, I attended all the first round games myself. If the baseball players would play, I would go. It was our duty as Americans, as American baseball fans, to stand together in the face of terrorism. It was our small part to play, and we had no idea of the history we were about to witness.

Even though the Yankees won the last three World Series, the recent attack made this one unlike any other. The old stadium in the Bronx still stood, but now it was a target for those who wanted to damage our way of life. The New

York Yankees having won the American League Eastern Division with a record of 95 wins and 65 losses finished thirteen and a half games above the second place Boston Red Sox. They were to play in the Division Series, against the Oakland Athletics, the Wild Card winners.

At home in a somber and quiet stadium, the Yankees lost the first two games of the five game series by scores of 5 to 3 and 2 to 0. Chances looked dismal for the New York team heading to Oakland, they needed to do something that never had been done before and win three straight starting on the road. They started off with a 1 to 0 lead in game three behind pitcher, Mike Mussina. With an Oakland runner on first and a shot into the right field corner, the lead was miraculously maintained by none other than Derek Jeter. The relay to home plate had been overthrown, cut off by Derek, and flipped to catcher, Jorge Posada for the out at home plate. Derek had ranged way out of position near the first base line to retrieve the throw. This kept the 1 run lead intact and the Yankees went on to win game three, 1-0 and then game four by a score of 9 to 2. This became known as the famous *Derek Jeter 'Flip play'*!

With the decisive game five back in New York City, the damaged World Trade Center Flag flying over Yankee Stadium, the Yankees had one more game to win to move on. The pregame was filled with more excitement than most with the stadium buzzing about Jeter's play out in Oakland. After a rousing National Anthem, the Yankees had Phil Rizzuto and Yogi Berra throw out the first pitch of game five. With both of them on the mound to throw out the first pitches, Yogi Berra threw his first pitch to Joe Girardi and the two Yankee greats walked off the mound toward the Yankee dugout. But Phil Rizzuto didn't throw his ball to Jorge Posada who was still waiting at home. Sure enough, Phil Rizzuto, jogging at about the first base foul line turned over his shoulder, looked at home and flipped the ball to Jorge Posada in homage to Derek Jeter. The stadium immediately erupted with cheering. The excitement was so palpable there was no way the Yankees would lose. And they didn't, winning 5 to 3, securing the next playoff round now against the 116 win Seattle Mariners!

A REVIEW – Spirits of the Three Village Cemetery Tour by Bev Tyler

Transport yourself to Setauket in the Roaring 20s and take a walk with the Spirits of the Prohibition: Flappers, Farmers & Bootleggers, Oh My!

The 23rd annual Spirits Tour was more than just a opportunity to meet Three Village residents from the 1920s; it was a total immersion into the time of speakeasies, stills and moonshine. In 1917, Congress passed the 18th Amendment with all but two states adopting it by January 1920 when enforcement began under the Volsted Act. The 20s was also the decade of women's suffrage. The 19th Amendment to the Constitution was enacted in August 1920 and gave women the right to vote. The 1920s also saw the first radio broadcast of a baseball game, the Charleston became a dance craze, and Gertrude Ederle became the first woman to swim the English Channel.

In September the Society presented a Prohibition Night at the Jazz Loft in Stony Brook featuring Tom Manuel and his Firehouse Five. This was a night to bring the 1920s to life as a preview for the upcoming Spirits Tour and Prohibition Exhibit.

"Spirits of the Prohibition: Setauket in the Roaring 20's" provided the overall theme for the Three Village Historical Society's 23rd Annual Spirits Tour in the graveyards of the Setauket Presbyterian Church and Caroline Episcopal Church this past October.

Locally in the Three Village area, in the 1920s, life went on somewhat as usual. The spirits of William Washington Bryant, Kate Wheeler

Strong, George Thomas Vingut, Etta Sherry, Robert Cushman Murphy, Sarah Ann Sells, Harry Golden, Eversley Childs, Ellsworth Buckingham, Celia Swezey Hawkins, John Ward Melville, Eugenio Goncalves DeTeixeira and Anne Rensselear Tinker made their appearances and delighted tour-goers with their stories. These were not the stories of gangsters flaunting the law and filling a need nor of young women flaunting convention, conduct and dress; these were ordinary people going about their daily lives while all around them the world as they knew it was transforming.

"My family was traditionally Episcopalian but my father, Melville Havens Bryant had become a rabid prohibitionist and the Methodist Church embraced temperance so we changed affiliation. Father was so committed to the cause that he would cross the street rather than walk in front of a saloon." (George Overin as William Washington Bryant, 1859-1937)

More than 300 tour-goers followed guides that took them on a walk to meet fourteen colorful, but deceased local residents who entertained them with stories of their lives and the people in the Three Village community. Guided tours began at five P.M. and a new group of tour-goers stepped out from the Setauket Presbyterian Church social hall every fifteen minutes through 7:45.

In addition to the tours through the cemeteries, tour-goers were treated to an exhibit on prohibition with many artifacts and visuals from the Long Island Museum prohibition exhibit "Midnight Rum" on view in the Setauket Presbyterian Church social hall. The exhibit featured Trommer's Brewery pre-prohibition beer keg which in 1933 Trommer pressed into service to help satisfy its large number of beer orders.

Tour-goers were also treated to an evening of jazz in the hall by the Ward Melville Honors Jazztet with Andrew Cavese, Max Lieberman, Miles Bruno and Jared Gozinsky providing the delightful jazz on bass, sax, guitar and drums.

"It was a court room, meeting hall, lecture hall but most notably what it was used for was square dancing and late at night if the spirit got my papa you would see some fancy footwork at the Stone Jug." (Holly Griesel as Etta Sherry, 1855-1956 talking about the Old Stone Jug in Stony Brook - now the Jazz Loft).

Stony Brook was also celebrated with stories about Robert Cushman Murphy. He and his wife Grace Barstow Murphy are actually buried in Rhode Island, but Murphy was here as a visiting spirit along with life-long Stony Brook resident Etta Sherry, who is buried in Oak Hill Cemetery in Stony Brook.

"Suffolk County, right here where you are, was the very first county in the entire world to have DDT banned in 1956 and Grace and I spearheaded that effort with some other people." (Art Billadello as Robert Cushman Murphy, 1887-1973)

Setauket's Kate Wheeler Strong, historian, teacher and story teller who is buried in the Smith-Strong Cemetery on Strong's Neck wrote articles on Long Island local history for the Long Island Forum from 1938 until 1976. She also put her articles into a series of booklets she called "True Tales."

event attracted twice as many people in 2017 than it did the year prior.

Hintze said he isn't surprised how popular it has become through Arceri.

"She's one of those people who has a great personality, she's friends with everybody," Hintze said. "She knows a lot of people, and she knows how to put them together."

Tyler agrees that Arceri has done a wonderful job, especially in getting various organizations involved in Culper Spy Day. Arceri reached out to local groups such as The Long Island Museum, The Ward Melville Heritage Organization and Drowned Meadow Cottage in Port Jefferson, which once was owned by the Roe family, members of the ring. The happening has also grown to include organizations outside of the Three Village area, such as Raynham Hall Museum in Oyster Bay and Ketcham Inn in Center Moriches. Tyler said Arceri is working with a historical society in Fairfield, Connecticut, to take part next year.

"I think it's very important to the area," the historian said. "It's starting to bring in people."

Steve Healy, the Three Village Historical Society's current president, said when it comes to questions he may have about local history, in addition to Tyler and Town of Brookhaven historian Barbara Russell, he considers Arceri one of his go-to

people.

"It's difficult in today's environment to dedicate time to history, and she seems to have found a good mix with history and with [her] work," he said.

Arceri has a knack for getting people to think about history, Healy added, saying it's apparent during both the Tri-Spy Tours and Culper Spy Day. He said the history buff connects with people by allowing them to ask questions and have a dialogue. She's known for asking participants: "What do you think happened? What do you think are the elements that drove this situation?" because she doesn't see historical events in black and white.

"Margo likes to engage people, and that's one of her strong points, too," Healy said. "She has many, but one of them is to engage people in a situation where they can have an honest, educated discussion."

Healy believes the future looks bright for Arceri and her Culper spy ventures.

"I think she's found a great niche where she can introduce local history to people and grow that further, because she's always looking to grow," Healy said. "That's one of the things that I really like about her. She'll have a conversation with me and say: 'Steve, I want to expand. I want to get more people involved in this. I want to teach more people to let them know what happened here.'"

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BRUSH, A most extraordinary American Family By John Yantz

While growing up in Greenlawn, Long Island, two close friends of mine were the brothers, Brian and David Brush. Once, while in high school, Brian made a casual comment that his family goes back a long time here on Long Island.

Having been interested in genealogy since about 1990 and having done many family trees for myself and others I recently decided to look into the family of my old friends from Greenlawn.

It wasn't long before I found out that Huntington was founded in the mid-1600's by brothers, Thomas and Richard Brush, from England and that my friends were direct descendants of Richard Brush. I also found that my friends were related to historical figures like Walt Whitman; were direct descendants of Edmund Doty, a passenger on the Mayflower and are also related by marriage to Richard "Bull" Smith, the founder of Smithtown, Lion Gardiner of Gardiner's Island and William P. Van Ness, who was Aaron Burr's second at his famous duel with Alexander Hamilton.

It was about then that I discovered that Stuart C. Brush had authored a book on the Brush Family of Huntington with the collaboration of Russell B. Brush, the uncle of my friends. The book is done in genealogical fashion listing all the descendants in each of thirteen generations since Thomas and Richard. The entire book is over 900 pages and accessible online. There are more than 13,400 people mentioned with over 5,800 having the surname of Brush. Each person mentioned has all the available vital statistics followed by the names of their children and most times a short synopsis of his or her life.

After reading the entire book and transcribing all the information onto the Family Tree Maker program, I came to realize that the Brush family was no ordinary American family.

Starting from Huntington some moved to other parts of Long Island including Stony Brook and Setauket, while some remained in Huntington. Over the years they migrated to New York City, all over upstate New York, New England, Canada, all points west and south and even outside the United States.

While very few were unsuccessful in life and died in poverty, most had occupations like farming, teaching, merchants, railroad workers, etc. that helped to build this great land over the 350+ years since the founding of Huntington.

Many also became outstanding and even somewhat famous in their endeavors such as politics, religion, industry, higher education, military, banking, medicine, newspapers and even sports. Many of these successful Brushes attended the best schools, such as Greenwich, Phillips and Andover Academies. They attended all the major colleges and universities including the Ivy League schools as well as the finest engineering schools like RPI and MIT and all the best schools in all the states that they

moved into.

Some who fall into this category of success are people like:

- Alexander Brush-three time mayor of Buffalo, New York.
- Graham Manvel Brush- founder of Sea Train Lines and a pioneer, inventor and expert in the field of freight transportation.
- Edwin Charles Brush- Baptist minister and missionary in India for thirty years.
- Louis Herbert Brush- who with a partner bought the Marion Star newspaper from President Harding and developed a chain of newspapers and radio stations across the Midwest.
- Jared M. Brush- Mayor of Pittsburgh from 1869 to 1872.
- John Tomlinson Brush- after owning several minor league baseball teams he bought the New York Giants and won the first world series. The Polo Grounds was originally called Brush Stadium.
- Dr. Charles Henry Brush- pioneer in psychiatric rehabilitation and clinical director of Kings Park Hospital for twenty-seven years.
- Alanson Partridge Brush- founder of Oakland Motor Car Co. in Pontiac, Michigan which was later to become the Pontiac Division of General Motors.
- Elizabeth Hinckley Brush- direct descendant of William Bradford, first governor of Massachusetts.
- Katherine Brush- writer for Cosmopolitan, Good Housekeeping, Colliers and Saturday Evening Post. Some of her stories were made into movies.
- Charles Edward Brush- worked at NASA and was involved in the training of Astronaut Edwin Aldrin who was second to walk on the moon.
- David Linsley Brush- collaborated with Richard Rogers on Variety Show.
- Colonel Henry Brush- elected to Congress in the early 1800's.
- Elijah Dewey- who took part in the Battles of Ticonderoga and Bennington in the American Revolution and was the husband of Eunice Brush.
- Elijah Brush- early Mayor of Detroit served under William Henry Harrison in War of 1812. Friend of Commodore Perry.
- And lastly, George Washington Brush of Huntington who was an officer in the Civil War and commanded a unit of "colored troops". He was with them at the siege of Fort Wagner which was the subject of the movie "Glory". He was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor for rescuing 400 of his men stranded on a steamboat and under fire from Confederate artillery.




